The 'material' of Sunday school



The unfolding story of the Bible is revealed progressively through 66 books. These books were written by human authors who were inspired by the Holy Spirit. They were written with an agenda to a real audience. **Through these books, by His Spirit, God works.** He gives new life and discipled His people.

At Sunday school our desire is to teach through books of the Bible and allow our teaching to be directed by the Biblical author. We want to make the *main point* of our teaching the main point the author is teaching. We want the *aim* of our teaching to be the aim the author had. When we think about *how* we teach, we want to use the literary style, techniques, and content the Biblical author uses. In short, **we want to teach the Biblical author's point, for the Biblical author's purpose, using the Biblical author's practice.** The more clearly this is done, the more clearly the children will have heard the living God speak to them. As we strive to do this, we pray the fruit would be thirty, sixty, and a hundredfold.

The team at St Helen's has worked hard studying some key books of the Bible. As we have done so we have endeavoured to write our material following the principles above.

3-5's material

The 3-5's material is presented as a skeleton of the session with the example Bible story.

Some parts of the session are provided, and some will need to be prepared. I.e. the Concept, Bible verse, and Action Rhyme are provided. But the concept explanation, Bible verse explanation, game and ACTS prayer will need to be prepared by the leader. Use the space in the material to do this.

The example Bible story has several functions.

Firstly, it is a short talk. This talk could be given verbatim, adapted, used for ideas, or ignored by the individual assigned to give the talk. For less experienced leaders they may wish to read verbatim the example talk, adding in props and visuals. For more experienced leaders they may wish to chop, change, and adapt the example talk as they see fit. For very experienced leaders they may wish to ignore the example talk and write their own, only looking at the example to see another voice on the passage.

Secondly, it is a commentary on the passage. For those not giving the talk the example helps them to understand the passage, how it can be taught, and areas of application. It will also indicate what the speaker might say so that everyone is aligned on the teaching.

Trust our promise-keeping God

Introduction to the book of Joshua

The book of Joshua isn't just a fun bedtime storybook. Neither is it a purely historical account of the people of Israel. The book of Joshua is designed to give us great confidence in the Lord – more specifically: that he is a promise keeper. The Lord has made us many good promises, but can we trust him to fulfil them?

The Lord had made the Israelites many **good promises**. He had promised to deliver them from Egypt and bring them to the Promised Land. He had promised to drive the nations out of this land, devoting them to destruction. He had promised to give the land to each of his people as an inheritance, and to live with them and bless them. Overall, God had promised his people rest. But will he keep his promise?

In **chapters 1-5** we have confirmation that the Lord has delivered his people out of Egypt. Here, a new Moses, as part of a new generation, through another Passover leave the wilderness and enter the land, fulfilling God's promise to Moses at the burning bush. God has kept his promise! In **chapters 6-12** we see the Lord delivering the land into the Israelites hands and destroying his enemies. Jericho gives us a 'pilot episode': the Lord does the work, and those who don't serve him are devoted to destruction; themes which carry through the rest of the section as city after city and king after king is conquered and totally destroyed. God has kept his promise! In **chapters 13-21** we see the land allotted to the people. Land is given to each tribe, and each clan, and each individual, all have an inheritance and all receive rest. God has kept his promise! **Chapter 21:45** conclude these sections: "Not one of all the Lord's good promises to Israel failed; every one was fulfilled." Far from being a promise breaker, God is a promise keeper.

"But, just as all the good things the Lord your God has promised you have come to you, so he will bring on you all the evil things he has threatened, until the Lord your God has destroyed you from this good land he has given you; If you violate the covenant of the Lord your God, which he commanded you, and go and serve other gods and bow down to them" Joshua 23:15&16. **Chapters 22-24** explain that though they must serve the Lord and keep his covenant, in order to keep the good things he has given them, they won't. In the rest of the Old Testament we see the people abandoning the Lord, and as a promise keeper, the Lord keeps his promise and removes them from all the good things he had given them.

This final section shows the reader the need for a **better covenant**. We need a covenant which only promises good to us, a covenant which is not reliant on us, and a covenant which deals with the problem of sin. This is the new covenant we have as Christians. In this new covenant God promises to deal with sin and to give us hearts which know and serve him. Those who put their trust in Jesus have received this promise and now nothing will jeopardise us from receiving the other promises God has made.

These **better promises** God has made to us, are similar to the promises he had made to the Israelites. God has, and furthermore will, deliver us from sin and death. God will mightily do all that's needed for us to enter the eternal rest and will totally destroy all who don't serve him. God will give each of us rest in his new creation, where we will each have an inheritance, live with him, and be blessed by him. I wonder which promises excite you the most.

Will God keep his promises to us? Yes! God is a promise keeper. Just as he kept his promises to the Israelites, we can totally trust him to keep his better promises to us.

Promises

Can you think of a promise that someone has made you? My friend promised me a really big bar of chocolate. Not a small bar, not a medium sized bar but a GIANT bar of chocolate. Mmm, yummy! Can I trust my friend to keep their promise?

Our God has made really good promises to us! But can we trust him to keep them? For the next few weeks, we're looking at a book in the Bible called Joshua. In the book of Joshua, we see God keeping one of his really big promises. God had promised that he would give his people a beautiful land to call home. The book of Joshua tells the story of how God kept this amazing promise. As we read Joshua and see God keeping his promise to his people, we'll see that we can trust God to keep his promises to us.

The story starts on the edge of the beautiful land God had promised. God's people were excitedly peering in [\[binoculars\]](#) to their new home, waiting to enter. God had rescued his people from Egypt and brought them on a long journey to this land. And now, God said, it was time to go in. 'Be very strong and brave' God said to Joshua, the leader of his people. 'I will keep my promise. I will be with you'. It was Joshua's job to lead God's people into the land and fight their enemies. So, God said Joshua had to be brave and strong. He had to trust God.

Before Joshua lead the people in, he sent some spies on a secret mission. Shh! The spies had to be very quiet and careful. Their secret mission was to tip toe into the land and check out the enemies. The problem was, a while before, Moses had sent some other spies into the land. Shh! They came back to God's people and frightened them! They said 'the enemies in the land look big and scary! God has brought us here to kill us!' Uh oh! Will that happen again? Will Joshua and the people be strong and brave or scared? Will they trust God to keep his promise?


So, the spies Joshua sent tip toed into the land. Shh! They crossed the river, went over the hills and into a big city called Jericho. They went into the house of a lady called Rahab. But the King of Jericho heard they were there. He sent men to find them. When they got to Rahab's house, Rahab said they've already left the city, 'Quick, go after them!' But they hadn't left. Rahab had hidden them on her roof! Shh! Rahab said that she had heard of the LORD. She'd heard how God had powerfully rescued his people from Egypt and brought them through the Red Sea. She knew that the LORD was giving his people this land. And so, all of God's enemies in the land were trembling with fear! Rahab knew that the LORD was on his people's side. And so, Rahab knew that she was on the wrong side, the enemy side! Rahab wanted to switch sides. She said, 'I know the LORD your God is God. Please save me and my family as I have saved you.' They promised they'd keep her safe.


The spies tip toed back. Shh! They went out of the big city, they went over the hills, they crossed the river, and came back to Joshua and the people. The spies told all the people; 'the LORD has given us this land, just as he promised. The people might look big and scary but guess what? They're scared of *us*! They know the LORD is on our side!' God's people didn't need to be scared! Joshua and the people could be strong and brave. God was on his people's side. They could trust him to give them the land. We've seen today that the LORD is on his people's side. We've seen that we can trust him too.


Let's pray that we keep seeing how much we can trust our God as we keep reading Joshua.

Delivery

Do you know what deliver means? Imagine your mum and dad wanted to buy you a new toy. So they go on their computer, they find one online, and they click 'buy'. As soon as this happens someone in a factory somewhere puts the toy in a cardboard box, tapes it up, and writes your address on it. It's then put in a van and driven to your house. And then, 'ding dong', you open the door, and the delivery man gives you the box. The toy has travelled all the way from the factory to your front door. It's been delivered safely [Show visually with toy, box etc.]

Or think about it like this. Imagine you've baked some cookies. Mmm! You think the cookies are so yummy that you want your friend to have some. So, you pop some in a tin, walk to your friend's house, knock on the door, and deliver it to them. The cookies have been delivered safely from your house to your friend's house. [Show visually with tin etc.]

Today we're going to see that the LORD delivers his people. We're going to hear that the LORD delivered his people from Egypt and into the land God promised them. [show with pictures] It's like God is a delivery man and his people are the package. Today we're going to see the LORD delivering his people from Egypt and into the land he had promised.

We saw God doing the first bit of his delivery, in Exodus. Remember how God's people were slaves under nasty Pharaoh. But God sent mighty plagues against him and brought his people out. But there was a problem... a big sea was in the way, the Red Sea. God's people couldn't go over it because there were no bridges. They couldn't go under it because there were no tunnels. They couldn't go across it because there were no boats. God's people were trapped! But... you might remember that God parted the waters. The waters rose up on one side and rose up on the other side, and God's people walked through the Red Sea on dry ground. God delivered his people safely out of Egypt. Wow!

But that's only half of the delivery, he still needs to safely deliver them into the promised land. And that's what we're going to see in our story today.

God's people are on the edge of the promised land. God told Joshua to get all the people ready to go in. First the priests would go with the Ark, that's the special box God's rules are kept in. Then all the people would follow.


But... uh oh! There's a big, wide river in the way – the River Jordan! It had lots and lots of water in it, like the river Thames. How were they going to get across without getting swept away? Maybe they could go over it. But there were no bridges. Maybe they could

go under it, but there were no tunnels. Maybe they could go across it, but there were no boats. They were stuck! How can they get into the land? Could they really trust God to keep his promise?


Do you remember how God parted the waters at the Red Sea? Well guess what? God did it again! The waters from upstream stopped flowing. They piled high in the sky as a big wall of water. And God's people walked through the river Jordan on dry ground. Just like God delivered his people safely out of Egypt, God delivered his people safely into the land. God's people didn't need to worry! God was keeping his promises. They could trust him to give them the land. We've seen today that the LORD our God keeps his promises. We've seen that we can trust him too. Let's pray that we keep seeing how much we can trust our God as we keep reading Joshua.



Jericho

Here is a picture of a baby elephant [\[or similar\]](#). Ahh! This baby elephant is so cute! But he's also in danger. There's lots of scary creatures and he's too small to fight them. Uh oh! But when a nasty snake comes along to try bite baby elephant, baby elephant's daddy comes charging in. He fights the nasty snake and stamps on it to keep his baby safe. The daddy elephant fights for his baby. In our story today, we're going to see that the LORD our God fights for his people. So, we can trust him to keep his promise.

God had brought his people through the river Jordan and delivered them safely into the beautiful land he'd promised them. But there was another problem: There were lots of God's enemies, living in this land. So, before God's people could settle into their new home, they had to fight. They had to go into battle with God's enemies and defeat them.

The first city God's people came to fight against was Jericho, this was where Rahab lived. But... uh oh! Jericho had big high walls all the way around it.  So high you couldn't climb over them. So thick you couldn't bash through them. So strong you couldn't knock them down. How were God's people going to defeat their enemies if they couldn't get into the city? Could they really trust God to keep his promise? God had delivered them into the land but how was he going to give them this land to live in when the cities were so big and strong like Jericho?

This was how: God told his people to march around the city walls. They marched around in this order: At the front were some guards. Then came seven priests blowing trumpets. Toot! Toot! Then came the ark – the special golden box with God's rules in. Then more guards. As they marched no one was to make a sound. Shh! Once they'd marched around the city they went back to their camp for the night. That was it! No fighting. No shouting. Just marching.

Then on the next day, they did it again. The army marched around the city walls. The priests blew their trumpets. Toot! Toot! But no one else made a sound. Shh! Then they went home again. And on the next day, they did the same. The army marched around the city walls. The priests blew their trumpets. Toot! Toot! But no one else made a sound. Shh! Then they went home again. They did this for six days!

But on the seventh day, instead of marching around the walls once, God's people marched around the walls seven times. And on the seventh time, when the priests had blown their trumpets (Toot! Toot!) Joshua told them, 'Shout! For the LORD has given you the city!' So, they shouted: AAAAAAAH! And the big, tall, strong, thick walls came tumbling down. God's people went into the city and destroyed everything apart from Rahab and her family.


God's people had many other battles after Jericho, and the LORD was always with

them. God fought for his people. He defeated his enemies and gave the land into their hands. God's people didn't need to worry! God was keeping his promises. They could trust him to give them the land. We've seen today that the LORD our God keeps his promises; he fights for his people. We can trust him too.

Home

I love Christmas morning, don't you? When all the presents have arrived and are sitting there underneath the tree. They've been given, we've got them, but now they just need to be handed out to everyone. In my family, it's always my dad who does that job. He goes round and hands out the presents to all the family.

It was a bit like that with the promised land. The LORD had delivered them into the land. Defeated their enemies. And could now give each of his people a bit of it. God had promised each one of his people a part of the land. It's like he'd divided it up between them and put name tags on each bit so Joshua knew who should get what. [\[Show map of the land with name tags on.\]](#) Just like all the presents under the Christmas tree have tags with names on them, so you know which present is for which person.

As Joshua was giving everyone their bit of the land, we hear about one man called Caleb. Caleb was a man who had trusted that the LORD would keep his promise.

Caleb is someone who's been around for a while. You might remember that Moses sent some spies into the land along time before Joshua did. Caleb was one of these spies. But Caleb didn't come back to God's people and frighten them like the other spies did! Caleb didn't say 'the enemies in the land look big and scary! God has brought us here to kill us!' Caleb said 'God is with us. He will fight for us. Let's trust him!' The people didn't listen to him, they were too scared. But Caleb still trusted God. Caleb knew God would keep his promise.

And now, Caleb asked Joshua to give him the special bit of land God had promised him. God did what he had promised. God gave him some hill country including the great city Hebron. Caleb and all his family and all his descendants could live there. Caleb was right to trust God. God has given Caleb what he had promised.

Caleb helps us to think about how we can trust God. Our God has made a really good promise to us too. God hasn't promised us a land here on earth. But he has promised us a home in the new creation he will make. One day God will make a whole new creation. It will be like this one just far greater. In God's new creation nothing will be sad and bad. Everything will be good and glad. It will be the most wonderful place to live. It will be our home forever, our home with God.

God has promised each one of his people a part of his new creation. If you trust in Jesus, God has a place for you in the new creation. When you're waiting for Christmas morning, you know that there'll be a present under the tree waiting for you. It has your name on it. Just like that, we know that God has a place for us in the new creation, a place we can call home.

So, as we wait, let's be like Caleb. Let's trust our God to keep his wonderful promise to us. Let's trust that one day he will give us our home in the new creation.

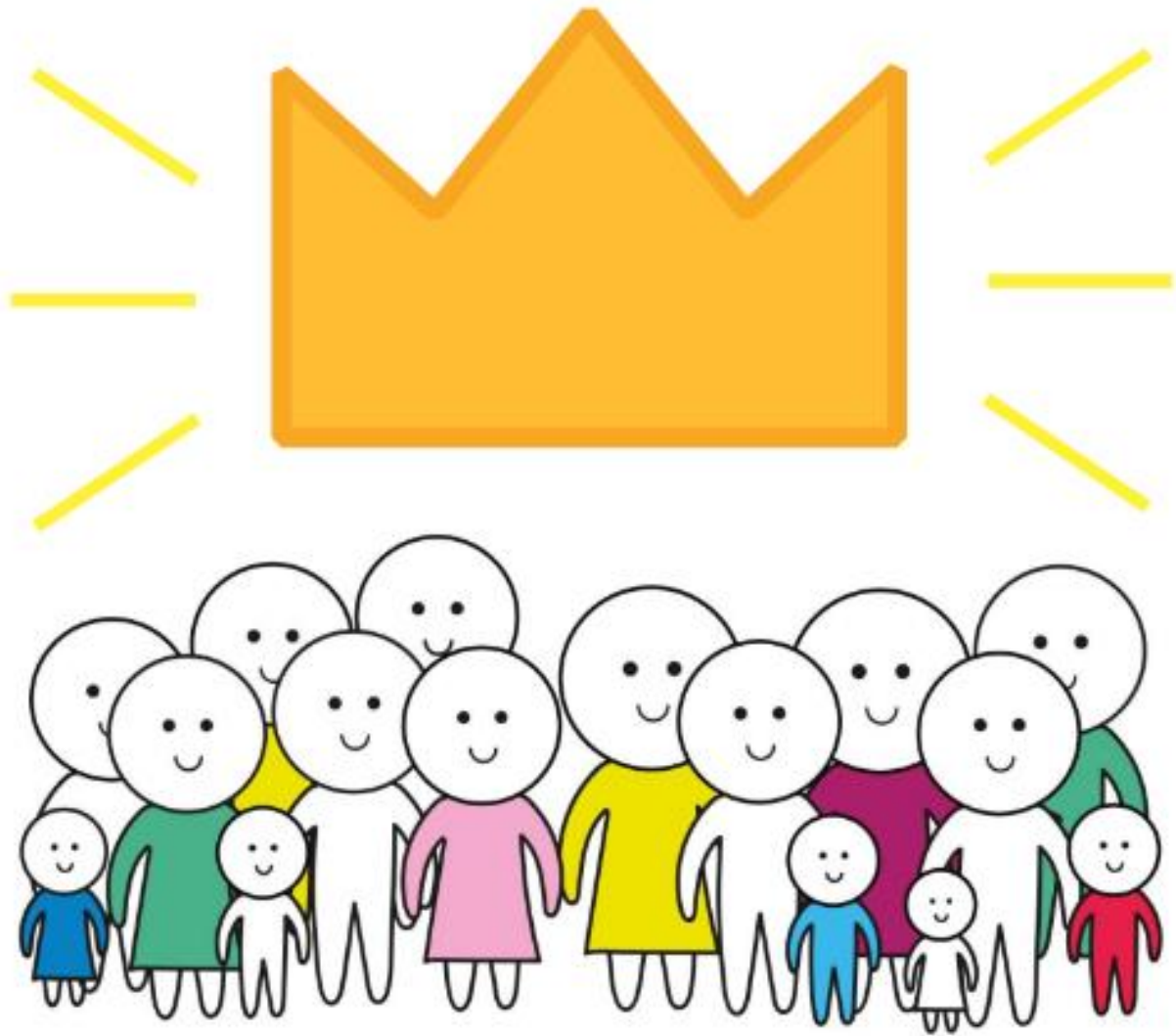

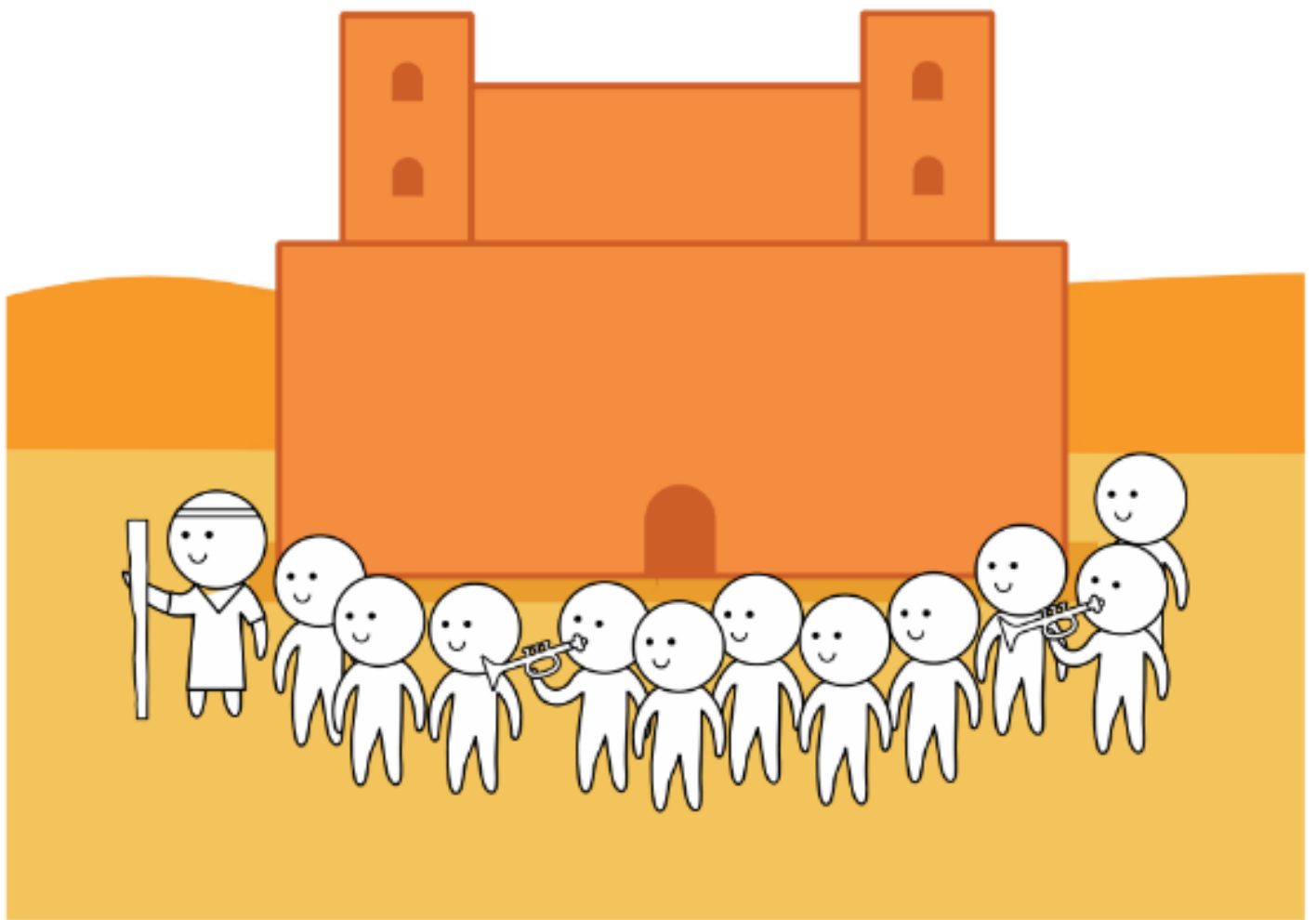
